<u>HIGH SCHOOL FRESHMAN SURVIVAL TIPS</u>

• High School Freshman Survival Tip #1

Do: Practice walking from class to class before the school year begins.

Don't: Be antisocial.

Clubs and activities are great ways to meet new people with similar interests. Fall sports usually start practice before the school year starts, so you can start making friends before your first classes. Don't be afraid to try new activities. You never know when you'll find something you absolutely love.

Clubs and activities aren't all about meeting people, though. Your volunteer hours and participation in extracurricular activities will help you stand out on your future college applications. College feels far away when you're a freshman, but it'll be here before you know it.

• High School Freshman Survival Tip #3

Do: Be respectful of your teachers.

Don't: Be late, unprepared, or rude in class.

Your first week of classes sets the tone for the rest of your year, and possibly the next three, too. Teachers are just meeting you, and first impressions count. Easier said than done, organization is essential to success in high school. Keep your notes and assignments organized by class. Keep an up-to-date planner and homework to-do list. Color coded folders and three ring binders with dividers are both great ways to keep your papers organized.

Also easier said than done: don't procrastinate. Instead of putting off less-than-pleasant activities and homework assignments, do the worst ones first. Getting the hard assignments out of the way will feel great, and you'll be able to fly through the other ones.

To keep yourself on track while you're working on homework, you can use productivity apps and plugins like Finish (iPhone), StayFocusd (Google Chrome), or SelfControl (Safari). With time management programs, you can block time-wasting programs, websites, or even the whole internet from your computer.
