From the prodigious hilltops of New Hampshire!.....Today was a very special day at GMS. At 10:00, our entire school gathered in the gymnasium. Ms. Seiden and our new third grade group, Kindness Counts Service Corps, presented a stirring and important assembly, celebrating civil rights through the life and work of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. They also told the story of Rosa Parks and her quiet decision to fight injustice on a Birmingham bus. They held protest signs demanding, "Equality," "Inclusion," and "Justice." We sang "We Shall Overcome" with Mrs. LaBelle conducting the audience to join in the chorus. And in the end, we listened to and watched a multimedia presentation of Dr. King's "I Have A Dream" speech, listening carefully for the line about our state, "And so let freedom ring from the prodigious hilltops of New Hampshire....Let freedom ring from the mighty mountains of New York" It was inspiring to see a new generation of Americans keeping alive the vision of universal human rights.

Several other special events help give a more complete picture of what life is like at GMS. While we celebrate those things that are truly important, like civil rights, we also take time for simple fun. At 9:30, the students from Mrs. McGowan's second grade class, Mrs. Llewellyn's third grade class, and Mrs. Ashe's fourth grade class gathered in the cafeteria for a pig race. These were the top three performing classes in the PTO's fall fundraiser, and they were racing their mechanical pigs for bragging rights and an ice cream social. The top spot went to Slow Poke, the pink pig from Mrs. Ashe's room. Second place went to Mrs. McGowan's green pig, sporting a red hat, Mr. Ba-Mr. Piggy, representing con. Mrs. Llewellyn's class, squeaked by in third place. All the students got small gifts from the organizers. Thanks again to the PTO for their continued support of the school, and our students and families for all their support of the fundraiser. By the time this gets published, the 3^{rd} Grade Kindness Counts Service Corps will have created and produced the first annual Kindness Counts Peace Day Assembly, in honor of Martin Luther King., Jr. As I write this over the holiday break, I am unsure how we will ever get there...but get there we will! With the help of a generous parent volunteer, Stephanie Anderson, the support of the PTO, and the wonderful 3rd grade teachers who have supported this endeavor from the start, this assembly promises to be a wonderful event.

An educational leader, Craig Sellars, once said, "The School-Wide Assembly is the classroom for community." By this he meant that assemblies are a vehicle for creating and sustaining a school community's cultural identity. A school's values, beliefs,

and character are revealed by and through the use of whole school gatherings. By focusing on the legacy of a great American hero like Martin Luther King, Jr., and by enabling a dedicated group of 3^{rd} graders to lead us through the event, we prioritize peaceful prob-

And the winner for the 2012 New Hampshire Ladybug Picture Book is Pete the Cat: I Love My White Shoes by Eric Litwin. This book won by a landslide in the state as well as in our school for the preschool through third grade students who can vote for this award. Fourth graders still have time to read the New Hampshire Great Stone Face Nominees to vote in April for their favorite.

The kindergarten classes have been listening to stories of how animals prepare for and survive the winter. These stories coincide with the themes that are being studied in the classroom.

The first grade classes have been introduced to the wonders of nonfiction literature.

The students in these classes have been listening to various nonfiction selections while learning about red-eyed tree frogs, polar bears, whales and penguins and how to use a table of contents. We have also been comparing fiction and nonfiction books. Most recently, the first grade students at GMS have been learning about Dr. Seuss. We read a biography about him and continue to hear stories that the famous author and illustrator wrote before his death in 1991. Be sure to ask your students about the three names that he used; Theodore Seuss Geisel, Dr. Seuss, and Theo. LeSieg.

Our second grade classes have been focusing on alphabetical order so that they can become more independent with finding books in the Everyone and Fiction sections of the library. This skill has also helped them with looking up words in a dictionary and will help them with our encyclopedia unit. Using an encyclopedia, each child will find information on a country that coincides with one of the countries that the second grade classes studied during their holidays around the world unit.

> The third graders at GMS have been focusing a great deal on the nonfiction section of the library. All of the classes have been learning about the Dewey Decimal System of Classification and the man who created this system, Melvil Dewey. The classes listened to a book titled <u>What</u>

Marion Taught Willis by Brook Berg and illustrated by Nathan Alberg. In the story, Marion the hedgehog teaches Willis the anteater that the nonfiction area of the library is not as confusing as it may seem. Marion teaches Willis that once you get the hang of using the Dewey Decimal System, the nonfiction area can be a great place to explore and learn new information. She exposes Willis many of the exciting topics that can be found in the nonfiction area. The third grade students have been working with partners to find titles of books in the nonfiction area of the library which coincide with the ten major classification areas of the Dewey Decimal System. They will then choose a nonfiction book to present to their classmates.

In the fourth grade, the students reviewed the fiction and nonfiction sections of the library. The fourth graders have played games such as "Dewey Go Fish" to help them become more familiar with the Dewey Decimal System of classification. Recently the students put actual book titles from the GMS library into one of the ten classes. They have been practicing ordering nonfiction call numbers.

Thank you to all of the people who volunteered to help out during the book fair. Some people worked more than one shift to make it happen! It is much appreciated! This fundraiser brought in slightly more than \$2,000 for the library to use to purchase materials and equipment for the students, parents and staff to use.

Please help your child to remember his or her library book by looking at the school calendar to see which days there are library specials. If the book is placed in the backpack the night before, then the book will be returned on time and he or she will be able to check out a new book. Even if a child wants to renew a book, it needs to be brought into the library to do so. Thank you for your assistance!



The students recently started the Granite State Fit Kids Program. This is a special, seven week program for fourth graders in New Hampshire. A presenter will be visiting each fourth grade class once a week to discuss topics such as nutrition, how our heart and lungs work, and how we digest the food we eat. The presentations are often interactive. Each student is also given an activity journal where they track their physical activity. Ask your fourth grader what they are learning this week in Fit Kids!

3RD GRADE NEWS SUBMITTED BY: THE THIRD GRADE TEAM

The third grade students have been working hard and learning many new things. We have just finished learning about magnets and electricity in science. The activities and experiments have been both fun and educational. We will now be turning our attention to social studies with a unit on westward expansion and life on the Oregon Trail. The students will find out what it was like to travel across the prairie and desert over 100 years ago. In March, you will find us experimenting once again, as we begin our science unit on rocks and minerals.

We have read many different types of literature including historical fiction, realistic fiction, and fables. Reading skills have been focusing on narrative elements, sequencing, and following directions. As we move into the third quarter, we will begin to focus on summarizing, as well as compare and contrast. Grammar lessons will look at many different types of adjectives. We will study adjectives for what kind, how many, and those that compare. Students should then be able to use these adjectives in their descriptive writing, so that the reader can really see and

feel what they are writing about.

All the classes are finishing up the unit on multiplication and will be moving on to division. Please continue to help your child study their multiplica-

tion facts every night. Mastering these facts is one of the most important foundational skills of third grade. We will show how multiplication and division facts are related as a fact family. Division will be explained as sharing equally and as repeated subtraction.

The third graders have just completed taking the MAPS test by the Northwest Education Association in reading and math. These tests are taken on a laptop computer. They help teachers see how each child is progress-

> ing in both subjects, and what skills still need to be worked on and taught next. We are looking forward to our upcoming field trip to the Museum of Science in Boston at the end of March. Each class will be having a

Valentine's Day party on February 14th. We hope you have a fantastic February vacation!

2ND GRADE NEWS SUBMITTED BY: THE SECOND GRADE TEAM

The second grade classes have been busy working on place value and mental math. Thank you to our parents for their continued support in helping our students master the addition and subtraction facts to 20. It can be quite a challenge to solve each problem in three seconds!

In reading, we are increasing our reading fluency and accuracy through daily practice. Remember it is a good idea to read aloud to your child to model fluency and good expression. We have just completed our third unit in reading titled, "Our World." Ask your child about the adventures of Johnny

Appleseed.

Our students enjoyed learning about several Native American tribes from across the different regions of the United States during our mini unit at Thanksgiving. Our "*Holidays Around the World*" tour was a success. Students enjoyed stories, crafts, and facts from various countries. Did you see our picture in the Hudson/Litchfield News?

In Science, we began learning about plants. The nonfiction stories from our anthology helped us to identify the

parts of a plant and the resources that plants like trees provide to people.

The children are beginning to learn their subtraction math facts too! Everyone is becoming more familiar with the Cuisenaire rods that we use in our classrooms during many of our math lessons. Geometry was our most recent unit of study. It was a big hit with all our first graders! The children loved learning all about plane and solid shapes.

During our Social Studies lessons, the children continued to learn about the different holidays celebrated throughout the year. In November, we read many books about the first Thanksgiving. During December, the children studied the holidays of Christmas, Hanukkah and Kwanzaa.
