A NOTE FROM SCOTT THOMPSON, PRINCIPAL

Recently parents have received reports from the school on two important assessments – the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) tests from Fall, 2015, and for students currently in grade 4, the results from the Spring, 2015 administration of the new state test, the Smarter Balanced Assessment. We have sent home letters explaining the results to those receiving them, but I thought a general overview of school testing might help parents.

Standardized tests are designed for a particular purpose. Generally speaking, academic tests fall into two categories – formative tests and summative tests. Formative tests are intended to monitor learning along the way – to help students and teachers identify areas of strength and areas that are mastered and other areas that need more attention. They can be used to change the teaching/learning experience for the better, by addressing the needs of real students in real time.

NWEA MAP tests are used for this purpose. Similarly, we use another assessment, AIMSweb to measure student skills and learning (reading and math) against benchmarks for their grade and time of year. AIMSweb benchmark tests are very brief, and normally administered three times a year to measure progress.

Summative tests are intended to measure final learning outcomes against a standard. The SBAC tests are summative. As described at the DOE website, The 2015 SBAC tests, “set a new baseline for how students are performing in the state and are the first to measure New Hampshire’s students’ progress toward the academic goals identified in the state’s College- and Career-Ready Standards for mathematics and English language arts. This assessment will provide a more accurate snapshot of how students are performing on a path to success after high school.” SBAC tests are given in the spring, and measure end-of-year learning expectations for that grade level.

The DOE website also points out that, “Participating Smarter Balanced states agree that while no single assessment can give a complete picture of student achievement, annual assessments, when combined with student grades and teacher reports, can provide important information to families about their child’s progress and areas for improvement and help guide teachers in daily instructional planning...” This is consistent with a long-held standard of triangulation in testing interpretation. We recognize that one bad (or very good!) day of testing may be misleading, so schools look for patterns across multiple tests to verify whether a student is performing at the expected level. We also consider daily classroom performance and teacher-administered academic assessments to try to develop a comprehensive picture of a student’s progress in meeting learning goals.

The assessments we use give us information about individual students, for sure, but they also let us see trends across grade levels. This helps us look at the school program for areas that may need improvement or change. For example, the 2015 Smarter Balanced results told us that in both grade 3 and grade 4, fractions were an area of relative weakness. We can use this information to plan instructional focus, lesson sequence, and lesson timing. In the case of fractions, we recognize that the units on fractions were taught late in the year, after the testing. Our new math program includes fractions earlier in the year, so we anticipate better results this year.

SECOND GRADE TEAM

The GMS second graders have been working hard and should be very proud of themselves! In math, we have been busy learning strategies for addition and subtraction of 2-digit numbers, using mental math as well as the more traditional regrouping method for finding sums and differences. Thank you, parents, for continuing to work on math fact memorization. You are helping us reach our goal of mastery of the addition and subtraction facts to 20 by 100% of our second graders!

In Reading, we have been hard at work learning comprehension skills and strategies for both fiction and non-fiction reading. When reading informational texts with your child, it would be helpful to discuss ‘text and graphic features’, such as bold print, headings, diagrams, and photographs. This helps the reader gather and find information. Through our reading we’ve learned about animal homes,

super storms, and jellyfish, and integrated this new learning into writing informational paragraphs.

We had a special visit in November from the New England Aquarium! Thank you PTO! We learned about the different habitats found along New England beaches, such as rocky, sandy, salt marshes, and tidepools. We learned how animals adapt to living in these habitats, and were able to touch and observe live animals!

As a friendly reminder, please remember to send your child to school with appropriate outdoor gear for recess. This includes a hat, gloves or mittens, a jacket, and snowpants and boots when it starts snowing. Also, it would be helpful if these items were labeled with your child’s name.

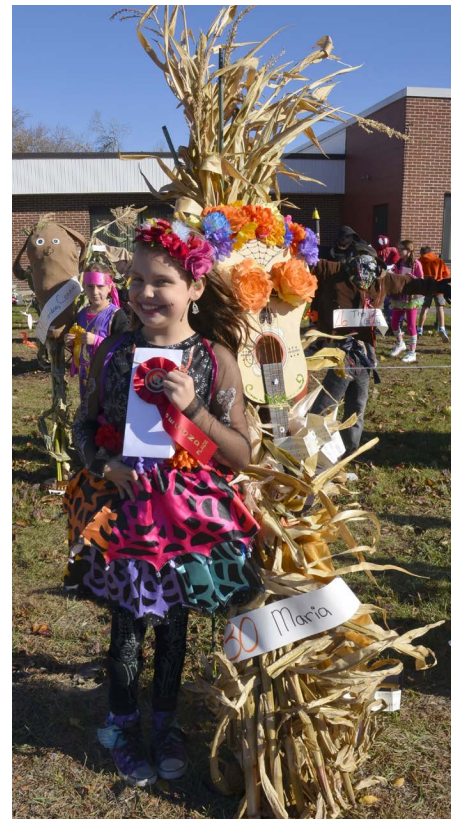

Second quarter is almost done here in 4th grade! Each class is hard at work exploring new topics and participating in fun, educational programs.



The fourth graders enjoyed their recent fieldtrip to Concord. We visited the State House and the New Hampshire History Museum. At the state house we sat in the oldest legislative meeting hall



in the USA. Here our representatives make important decisions about NH laws. We also got to see where our governor, Maggie Hassan, works. The NH History Museum was also exciting. We saw the original gold eagle that stood on the top of the state



house, as well as portraits of royal governors and a rare Revolutionary War flag. Looking at New Hampshire artifacts from the past taught us so much!

Mr. Jon Nute, a New Hampshire forester, visited the 4th graders at GMS for an on-site field trip. He took us on a nature walk and taught us all about the trees of New Hampshire. Did you know that NH is the 2nd most forested state in the USA? We have 74 different species of trees here! We loved learning about the nature around us!



In math the fourth graders have begun learning long multiplication and will soon be on to long division. Please encourage your child to practice their multiplication and division facts at home to make this process easier. Some students have been using Xtra Math at school. This is a free, online program to practice math facts. Please encourage your child to use this program at home as well.

The Tournament of Readers Program is well underway. We are so proud of the Tournament of Readers participants for giving their time to read and

compete in the program. We cannot wait for the final tournament in early February!

The Granite State Fit Kids program is beginning in January! This is a seven week program designed by a Nashua doctor to teach the students about how their body works as well as about being healthy and making healthy choices. Each week the students will engage in hands-on activities to help learn and motivate. Each student will keep a log of the daily exercise they do. We hope the program motivates our students to be active and make healthy choices throughout the entire year.

KINDERGARTEN TEAM

We are off to a great start in math, we continue to work on counting and number formation. We have also been working on counting sets of objects. Identifying which number is greater than and which is less than is a very important skill for number sense and classifying objects into sets.

In language arts, we have been using our new program Journeys, the students have worked hard to associate each letter with its sounds. We use these sounds to make words. We are using popcorn words to write and illustrate simple sentences. Please remember to read each night with your child!



We have begun to explore a unit on “The Gingerbread Man”. We have read several versions of the story and are comparing and contrasting the characters and setting of each story.

LIBRARY NEWS,

The kindergarten classes have been listening to stories of how animals prepare for and survive the winter. These stories coincide with the themes that are being studied in the classroom.

The first grade classes have been working on alphabetical order as it pertains to finding books in the library. Our second grade classes have been also been focusing on alphabetical order so that they can become more independent with finding books in the Everyone and Fiction sections of the library. This skill will also help them with looking up information in books, dictionaries, encyclopedias and other reference materials.

The third and fourth graders at GMS have been reviewing the fiction section. The third graders have also been working on a magazine assignment that includes how to use the Table of Contents. The fourth graders are going to be spending a great deal of time on the nonfiction section (how it is organized and how to find books in numerical order.)

Thank you to all of the people who volunteered to help out during the book fair. Some people worked more than one shift to make it happen! It is much appreciated! This fundraiser brought in \$2,000 for the library to use to purchase materials and equipment for the students, parents and staff to use and \$816.00 to purchase books from Scholastic. The PTO had donated up to \$4.00 per kindergartener so that each of those students could walk away with a book, which was wonderful!



Please help your child to remember his or her library book by looking at the school calendar to see which days there are library specials. If the book is placed in the backpack the night before, then the book will be returned on time and he or she will be able to check out a new book. Thank you for your assistance!

Connect the Dots to Thrive in School and Beyond

In our first Guidance Perspectives, we started with the statement that ‘all children have the potential for greatness and success.’ During this school year we have been working with students helping them to ‘connect the dots’ focusing on optimism, persistence, flexibility, kindness, respect, reliance and empathy.

As parents you can encourage your children to focus on their interests, strengths, and skills, identify pathways to “connect the dots” to reach goals, challenge themselves with new things, and persevere through difficult problems to reach their potential in school and in life. There are many ways families can help children connect the dots and thrive.

WAYS FAMILIES CAN HELP CHILDREN CONNECT THE DOTS AND THRIVE

1. Encourage your child to set goals and to map out a plan for achieving.
2. Help your child internalize a sense that he can achieve by reinforcing the skills already developed and encouraging him to try new challenges.
3. Help your child identify his strengths and interests and learn new skills.
4. Emphasize that learning and growing requires trying new things and that success comes from small steps to a long-term goal.
5. Help her work through setbacks or lack of self-confidence by helping to identify negative thoughts that may suggest concerns about her ability to be successful. As a parent, you can help children see what the small steps are and how persisting and overcoming obstacles is a part of succeeding. Help her realize that setbacks are not permanent or all-encompassing.
6. Praise attempts as well as success and make sure that you focus on the effort put into the success.
7. Create an environment at home that allows your child to explore building (blocks, helping with projects, and more), drawing (crayons, finger paints, paper), and music (on the radio, with children’s instruments, or through formal training).
8. Model perseverance and problem solving when faced with challenges or difficulties.
9. Demonstrate, through your own behaviors, how to identify and achieve long-term goals by thinking aloud, creating a pathway of short-term goals, and using problem solving and decision making skills along the way.
10. Help your child develop positive relationships with peers and adults and model respectful, caring behaviors with others.
11. Encourage your child to participate in community activities that may help her develop positive behaviors, such as being thankful and having gratitude. In particular, volunteer activities may encourage the development of positive behaviors.
12. Participate in community events or encourage your child to participate in extra-curricular activities in the community to increase her connectedness with community members, including other children and adults alike. This will increase your child’s well-being, achievement, and also create a sense of community, safety, and security amongst adults and children.
13. Seek out support systems available in the community to help your child learn new skills and thrive, such as tutoring or mentoring programs.
14. Consider learning more about Positive Psychology, and what enables children or individuals to thrive (www.positivepsychology.org/books).

THIRD GRADE TEAM

The third grade students have been having a lot of fun learning about multiplication and division. Please keep working with your child at home to help them master the multiplication facts. You can play games together or have them practice their facts on the computer, as well as use flash cards to work on mastery.

During the middle of December, we will be reading the book *Amos & Boris* by William Steig. It is about a wonderful friendship that develops between a mouse and a whale. Although the two animals have nothing in common, they become great friends. This is a wonderful life lesson for the children to learn. We will be discussing the question, "What makes a good friend?"

The third grade classes will be wrapping up our social studies unit on the foundations of government before the holiday break. Students have been

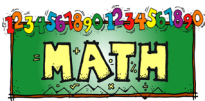
