The Principal's Corner

It is hard to believe that we are finishing up the first quarter of the 2013-14 school year. So much has happened since we started school 10 weeks ago, and there is much to share with parents. I know there will be many articles in Tiger Times about classroom and grade level events. I would like to focus my column on some important changes in curriculum and assessment at GMS.

First the immediate: the first quarter officially ends Wednesday, November 6. Reports will go home on November 13. and Parent Teacher Conferences will be held on November 14 (evening) and 15 To make (daytime). this all possible, there is no school for students on Friday, November 15.

Over the last year or two, you have heard lots of information about new standards for learning and teaching. Litchfield teachers worked together last year to create Litchfield curriculum guides, using the Common Core standards as a resource document. The new stan-

dards call for even higher levels of achievement for our students, and they already are among the highest achieving students in New Hampshire. Our teachers have begun implementing the changes that were made this year in their classrooms, and as a result, we have made some minor changes to our report cards. The report cards will look as they have



in the past, but some benchmarks have changed.

Our teachers have been learning about new ways to measure student learning this year. A team of eight teachers and administrators have joined with teams from LMS and CHS to be part of the NH Quality Performance Assessment network. We, along with schools across

the state, are exploring better ways to connect assessment with learning and creating model lessons that include multiple, authentic ways for students to demonstrate their knowledge and understanding

Our teachers have begun to learn about a monitoring system we are piloting this year called Aimsweb.

Aimsweb allows us to assess and monitor individual progress in reading and math. We have just learned about this system in the summer, and did a first administration of the Aimsweb assessments in the months of September and October. We anticipate sending home parent reports after the spring assessments in May and

June.

And lastly, parents of third and fourth graders are aware that this year was the last year for the annual NECAP (New England Common Assessment Program) tests in reading and math. In the spring of 2015, we will begin using a new state assess

ment aligned with Common Core standards, called the Smarter Balanced Assessment. Since this is a brand new assessment, and is computer-based, there will be lots of questions about how it operates. In order to help our school be prepared, GMS has applied to participate in a field test of the Smarter Balanced assessment in the spring of 2014. We

chose to have grade 3 do the pilot, since grade 4 will be doing the NECAP Science test at around the same time. The school should have notification about whether our application was accepted soon.

I wanted to share a little information about our recent Teacher Workshop on the delayed opening day, October 16. Our teachers packed a lot of training into those two hours. The first hour (teachers and paraprofessionals) was spent learning more about the Aimsweb system. The second hour was focused on the Quality Performance Assessment initiative. It affects all teachers, in that we are working on fall writing prompts as our first project. Para-

professionals met with our related service providers to discuss issues and strategies relevant to their positions. Our second delayed opening is scheduled for Wednesday, December 11. We know delayed openings present a challenge for families, but it means a lot to our teachers to have time to work together on professional growth activities.

3rd Grade News

The third grade classes have been very busy learning many new things. In reading we have been working on identifying the characters, setting, and plot of the story. The children have also been learning about character qualities and author's purpose. They have been practicing how to look up words in the dictionary and how some words can have multiple meanings. This is a skill you could help practice at home when you come across a word your child does not know.

In math we are finishing up our unit on 3 digit addition and subtraction and using rounding to estimate an answer to a problem. The children then use this estimate to check the rea-

sonableness of their actual answers. Our next topic will be multiplication. This is one of the most important foundational skills taught in third grade. Soon, it will be very important to begin working with your child to memorize the multiplication facts. Be on the lookout for more information from your child's teacher.

Our next social studies unit will be on the Jamestown Settlement, the American Revolution, and the foundation of our new country's government. We are plan-

ning a field trip to the Concord Museum in Concord, MA, just before Thanksgiving, where we will learn more about the relationships between the colonists and the Native Americans. We are very fortunate to live in an area so rich in American history.

The students really enjoyed the recent Tiger presentation on the uniqueness of each person and how we all need to be treated with tolerance and respect. We would like to thank the PTO for bringing this outstanding presentation to our school.

The third grade team would like to thank the parents for all the help and guidance you give your children in completing their homework, studying for tests, and learning those math facts. Your partnership is very important to their success. Thanks for all the wonderful treats you sent in for our Halloween parties too!

2nd Grade News

The second grade classes have had a wonderful start to their new school year. Everyone has adjusted well to second grade routines and expectations.

All of our students know that in order to become a better reader they need to practice reading every day. We read each day in school. Please make every effort to read with your child and practice the weekly vocabulary words. This will make your child a more fluent reader.

Memorizing our math facts to 20 is another important part of Grade 2. At home, we encourage you to practice math flashcards or play math board games. Using your computer and accessing web sites that practice facts can be fun too. If

you have a smart phone or a tablet, there are now several applications that you can download to practice facts as well.

In Science this quarter, we are learning about Animal Classifications. We are looking forward to a PTO Enrichment

Program on Tidal Pools. Be sure to ask your children what animals make their habitat in a tidal pool. We are currently learning about "Communities" in Social Studies. As you drive through our town of Litchfield, point out things

that are important to our community like the fire department, the farms and the library. We would like to thank the Litchfield firemen who visited this month and taught our student about Fire Prevention and Safety.

Our heartfelt thanks go out to all the families that have generously donated classroom supplies to us. It is very much

appreciated! As the cold weather approaches, please label your child's jackets and sweatshirts they wear to school. We don't want them to get lost. Lastly, if your child does not know how to tie their own shoes or zip



MATH CORNER

By: Margaret Parent. Title I Math

There are many ways you can help your child review and reinforce math skills at home. Have your child practice sequencing by counting forward and backwards by ones, twos, fives, or tens. Look for and recognize patterns in numbers and shapes. Have your child practice estimating the cost of items and do simple math problems 'in his/her head' to find the sum or difference. Practice math facts as a game using flashcards, playing cards, or practicing facts while riding in the car, before bedtime, or around the dinner table. The math activities you do with your child should be fun. Practicing these activities will help develop strong math skills.

There are also several commercial games that reinforce math as you play. When

choosing a game, check to see that it is fun to play, has educational value, and depending on the age of the child, lasts from 10 to 30 minutes. Below are some games that reinforce math skills and would make great gift ideas for birthdays or the holiday season.

Candy Land - (ages 4+: counting, adding/subtracting, number recognition)

Chutes and Ladders - (ages 4+: counting, adding/subtracting, identification)

Checkers—(ages 4+: sequencing, patterns, spatial orientation, strategy)

Chinese Checkers - (ages 4+: patterns, spatial organization, strategy)

Connect Four—(ages 6+: pattern recognition, spatial orientation, visual clustering)

Simon - (ages 8+: multi-step directions, sequencing, patterns, memory)

Battleship - (ages 7+: graphing, spatial orientation, visual memory)

Othello—(ages 7+: reasoning, spatial perception, strat-

egy)

Stratego— (ages 8+: spatial orientation, graphing, logic)

Yahtzee—(ages 8+: one & two digit addition, multiplication, estimation, predicting)


