The Principal's Corner

As I reflect on the close of the first quarter, one thing has become very clear: this is a

much-loved and thriving school; our students and their parents demonstrate that every day through their caring attitudes, their involvement, their commitment to high achievement; our dedicated teachers work tirelessly to provide our students with a first class educational opportunity.

While a goal for Miss Faro and me has been to nurture and sustain our many successful practices, new things are also happening. Certainly a big emphasis for our staff this year has been to begin the process of aligning our curriculum with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). The Common

Core standards have been adopted by nearly all states, and will replace

the current NH state standards. New Hampshire schools are expected to implement the CCSS by the fall of 2013, and a new state test will follow. As discussed at Parent Information Night, another important development this year is the expansion of Morning Meeting in

classrooms, as a way of keeping students engaged both academically and socially. This past week,

all classroom teachers had a half day of training with our math consultant Mahesh Sharma. Professor Sharma visited GMS last year, and will return in the spring of 2013. He is also working with math teachers at LMS and CHS, so that our teachers will have a shared understanding about effective techniques for teaching

mathematics. At GMS, Professor Sharma taught demonstration lessons, with staff in attendance, in Mrs. Webster's first grade classroom and Mrs. Levesque's third grade classroom. The students responded well to using Cuisenaire rods and interactive instructional models to unravel the mysteries of number sense, place value, and mathematical functions.

As we begin a new quarter, I encourage all parents to take advantage of the many opportunities to participate directly in school activities. Certainly it is well-established that we welcome volunteers. I'm aware that there are still some classrooms that are looking for volunteers, so if you are interested in helping out, contact the PTO Volunteer Coordinator, Cortney MacDonald. This year I am excited to roll out a comprehensive classroom guidance plan that focuses on four critical components of social and emotional learning. The goal is to raise student competencies in each of the following areas:

- Self-awareness: identifying emotions, selfconfidence, and self-efficacy
- Self-Management: impulse control, stress management, self-discipline, motivation, goal setting, and organizational skills.
- Social Awareness: Perspective taking, empathy, appreciating diversity, respect for others, taking responsibility
- 4. Relationship Skills: Communication, social

engagement, relationships, cooperation

I will be visiting each classroom approximately eight times per year to do lessons that focus on these important areas. One of the underlying themes within each of these areas is learning how to be a good problem solver. By helping students identify multiple solutions to a single problem, and

to evaluate the solutions, we nurture a life skill that is essential to success.

Another exciting program I am starting this year is the Kindness Counts Service Corps. Twenty four students in 3rd grade applied to participate in this program, and all of them will be able to join. This will be a service learning program for third graders. I have found that 3rd graders are ready to take on the challenge of helping others in a structured way. They are passionate about their beliefs and ready to give back to their communities. I am excited to harness some of that great, altruistic energy this year with our GMS Service Corps!

I am pleased to announce that as of our last meeting, we have a full board of volunteers working hard to assist our students and faculty. The GMS PTO Board consists of:


