years, Miss Faro has added a Master's Degree in Education for Reading and Learning from U. Mass. Lowell, a SAIF

> certification (Specialist in the Assessment of Intellectual Functioning) from New England College, and a Certificate of Advanced Graduate Studies in Education Administration, also from U Mass Lowell.

Miss Faro served with distinction as our Reading Specialist for 37 years, and retired from full time employment in 2012. That year, she became our part-time Assistant Principal. This June, she'll be leaving the school and the community she has loved for 42 years.

A MOMENT TO REFLECT CONTINUED




In the SERFA program, every student receives small group instruction in reading from their classroom teacher, tutors, or both depending on their ability level. SERFA benefits all students at GMS. She also created our

Tournament of Readers, a fourth grade event which inspires the students to voluntarily read additional novels on their own time, and then compete to win the top spot in a competition which tests their comprehension, memory and understanding of the

works. In the early 1980s she was also a co-advisor for the GMS Olympics of the Mind team that went to the national competition in Maryland. Olympics of the Mind was a precursor to Odyssey

FIRST GRADE TEAM

We are so proud of how hard our first graders continue to work! In math, we continue to work on mastering all our addition math facts to 20 as well as working on our subtraction math facts. We are continuing to work on our units which teach our students how to show numbers as tens and ones. Math was plentiful in first grade on the 100th day of school! Many children brought in projects that were completed at home with a common theme of "100"! Everyone did a fantastic job on their projects!

During our reading lessons, the children are continuing to learn the different phonics rules to help them sound out unknown words. We are currently working on our fifth reading book. One more book to go before the end of the school

year! Everyone enjoyed the visit from local author Marty Kelley. Thank you PTO! The first graders LOVE when our LMS reading buddies come to visit. Please have your children READ, READ, READ over the summer.

In Science, we are continuing to work on our Project Lead the Way units. We completed our Light and Sound unit. The children are enjoying all the different activities involved with our Animal Adaptations unit. We are also learning all about our five senses. During our Social Studies lessons, the children have been working on their mapping skills. They are learning how to identify the different characteristics on a globe and a map (oceans, continents, states, to name a few).

Everyone had a great time at the Math and Reading Carnival Night! Both parents and children left with many new math and reading games to play at home. The children have been working really hard preparing for their Spring Arts performance to be held on May 25th. They are also looking forward to Grandparents and Special Friends Day which will be held on May 26th. We hope to see you there! On June 15th, we will be going on our field trip to Squam Lakes Natural Science Center! This will be a great connection with our Animal Adaptations unit!

LIBRARY NEWS,

Happy spring! As always, we have been busy in the library!

Kindergartners learned had books read to them and songs sung to them about various subjects as they relate to what they are learning in their classrooms, such as Arctic animals and dinosaurs. They will be learning about insects and plants as well.

The first grades learned about many topics such as nonfiction, Dr. Seuss, fables, nursery rhymes, mysteries and animal adaptations.

Second graders used reference materials such as the dictionary and encyclopedia. They are learning about the children's author and illustrator, Tomie dePaola and some of his stories. They will learn about biographies, fairy tales, the Caldecott Medal as well as research animals.

The third grades are gaining practice with expanding their vocabulary with Thesauri as well as receiving help with understanding fiction call number order, which involves practicing alphabetical order.

Fourth graders have been working on poetry and atlas skills and then we will learns some myths and tall tales. Students who read any of the New Hampshire Great Stone Face Award Nominees for the 2016-2017 school year voted for which one is their favorite. The book that received the most votes among our fourth graders is Pugs of the Frozen North by Philip Reeve. We will find out soon which book actually won the award after all of the votes from 4-6th grade in N.H. are tallied.

KINDERGARTEN TEAM

Fourth quarter is going by extremely quick. We are ending the year with units on different creatures, such as the animals of a pond, insects and animals of the ocean. We started May off with a visit from Michelle's Menagerie and her woodland animals. The students learned about flying squirrels, partridges and several other animals. Did you know there are more flying squirrels in this area than gray squirrels? We do not see them often as they are nocturnal. During our insect unit, we learned how to tell if a bug is an insect or not (insects have six legs, three body parts and

can have two or four wings). It has been a great year of learning in kindergarten.

SECOND GRADE TEAM

The GMS second graders have been working hard and should be very proud of themselves! In math, we were very busy, learning how to use addition and subtraction skills to solve 1- and 2-step word problems. We also became experts in working with time and money. Of course, any reinforcement you can give at home in these two areas would be greatly appreciated! Adding groups of coins (using skip-counting) and telling time on a clock face are the two areas where any practice would be most helpful. Thank you, parents, for continuing to work on math fact memorization. You are helping us reach our goal of mastery of the addition and subtraction facts to 20 by 100% of our second graders!

In Reading, we have been hard at work learning comprehension skills and strategies for both fiction and non-fiction reading. We have enjoyed reading biographies, learning about the lives of several famous Americans, including Helen Keller. We have learned about the life cycle of plants, how to make a Navajo rug from the wool of a goat, and the legend of how weather vanes came to be. We continued to practice the three types of writing (informational, opinion, and narrative), with a focus on using descriptive details in writing.

We had an amazing time visiting the SEE Museum in Manchester. We learned how to make Silly Putty by turning two liquids into a solid using heat and pressure. What a great way to kick off a science unit about MATTER! We look forward to a fun-filled last month of learning.

THIRD GRADE TEAM

It is hard to believe that the school year is coming to a close so quickly. The third grade team would like to thank all the parents for their support throughout the year. Your help with homework and teaching your children how to study for tests is invaluable. All the tissues, wipes, and other classroom supplies you sent in really helped our days go more smoothly. We would also like to thank the PTO for the many enrichment opportunities they provided for our students. Our final big event for the year will be a field trip to the Museum of Science on Monday, June 19th. Please watch for the permission form which will be coming home soon.

The third grade classes have just finished up our unit on immigration. The children learned a great deal about the millions of Europeans who immigrated to the United States during the early 1900's. The students gained an understanding of why these people came and an appreciation for the many contributions the different cultural groups brought to the U.S. We studied what it was like to pass through Ellis Island, and how afraid the immigrants were of being sent back to their own country.

Our social studies topic in the fourth quarter will be economics. The children will learn the difference between needs and wants, as well as what it means to be a producer and a consumer. The culminating event for this unit will be a class job fair, where students can explore being a producer or offer a service, as well as be a consumer.

Our final science unit will be on forces and simple machines.

The students will work in groups to build simple and compound machines. They will be able to identify the attributes and components of the six simple machines, and the various forces at work. The teams will work together and apply scientific ideas about magnets and simple machines to solve a simple design problem.

End of the year math lessons will focus on geometry, time, and measurement. There will be plenty of hands on fun as we construct shapes and find perimeter, as well as explore time, capacity, weight, and mass.

We hope you have a wonderful, safe, and relaxing summer. Please remember to read and study those multiplication facts!

FOURTH GRADE TEAM

We continue to be hard at work in fourth grade. In math, we have tackled fractions and are moving on to decimals, measurement, and geometry. The fourth graders had a ball celebrating Read Across America Week! We loved seeing the creativity put into each spirit day. We especially liked when the whole school sat in the hall to pleasure read. What a neat experience! In social studies, we recently attended a New Hampshire Historical Society program called "Hands at Work". This program taught the students about the Industrial Revolution in New England. It gave the students a sneak peek at what they will be learning on their next field trip. We are looking forward to visiting the Lowell Boott Cotton Mill, on May 17. We will take a hands-on look at what it was like to work in the mills in the 1900s. The fourth graders recently enjoyed a series of interactive demonstrations on force and motion presented by a Boston Museum of Science teacher. The students successfully lifted Mrs. CullenKent off the ground using a simple machine! Spring assessments are underway! The 4th graders recently finished the NECAP Science Tests. Next, we will continue the Smarter Balanced testing in math at the end of May. Finally, the students will be assessed in reading and math using AIMSWeb Plus. During these testing times, please be sure to have your child get a good night's rest and eat a healthy breakfast. Finally, be on the lookout for a notice of special 4th grade events coming this spring. We have lots planned to celebrate the students' final days at GMS! COMPUTER LAB NEWS,

TERESA PLANTY M.ED., TECHNOLOGY TEACHER

The 2016-2017 school year has been very exciting for me as the Griffin Memorial School Technology Teacher. The computer lab here at GMS provides for an excellent environment for students to learn about technology. I enjoy coming to work every day and teaching the students all about using the computer. The students seem to enjoy computer class and learning about new technology.

This year I see students in Grade 2 - Grade 4 on the regular Specialists schedule. I also see each class in Grade 1 for one quarter of the year. Only Grade 4 had computer lab experience so I knew right away we had a lot of learning to do.

The fourth-grade classes started right in on keyboarding skills using TypingPal. They have created authentic projects using MS Paint, MS Word, and MS Excel. The students also learned about several Google Apps and how they can transfer the skills learned in Microsoft to these apps. Students learned how to use the virtual flashcard app called Quizlet and learned how to code on Code.org. We also spent a few class periods learning technology skills needed for online testing. We will wrap up the year learning about digital portfolios and digital citizenship.

The third and second grade classes started out learning some basic technology skills. The Mouse program we used right away to build mouse skills. The students used an interactive whiteboard activity to "Find the Technology" and the Quizlet app to learn technology terms and digital citizenship terms. We use Dance Mat Typing to learn basic keyboarding skills before accessing Typing Pal. Students created authentic projects in MS Paint. We spent several weeks on Digital Citizenship lessons. The students learned a little bit about coding in Code.org. Grade 3 also worked on learning technology skills needed for online testing. The students will finish up the year working with Chromebooks and digital portfolios.


