A NOTE FROM SCOTT THOMPSON, PRINCIPAL

You may have noticed that your children talk about learning math facts with automaticity – being able to recall the fact without having to recalculate or count. To understand the importance of this foundational skill, we often draw on the parallel model in reading. When a child is first learning to read, they learn letters and the sounds they make, spelling patterns (chunks), and eventually whole words and phrases. A fluent reader can process many words per minute without having to sound out any of them, because over time the letters, words and even whole phrases have found their way into their long term memory. We see the phrase *many words per minute*, and we read it at a glance. Learning letter sounds and spelling well allows us to focus on the meaning and intent of what we are reading, not just the difficult task of turning abstract symbols into sounds. Said differently, the ultimate goal of literacy is understanding written text, not just sounding out the words.

Likewise, numeracy is more than just basic math skills. Basic math facts are building blocks, and they should be learned to automaticity, so that the learner can use this knowledge in a larger context. Certainly a strong foundation in number sense is going to make a student better prepared for academic challenges like algebra, geometry, calculus, and scientific

courses. Thorough mastery of math facts and place value pave the way for us to confidently apply math knowledge to everyday life, to such things as time, money, problems in area or volume, probability, percentages, and understanding the significance of very large or very small numbers. Our students are familiar with online sources to help with math fact practice, particularly Xtramath.org., a web-based program that can be accessed from any online computer. Many students are also familiar with mathfactscafe.com. On this website, you can create worksheets for untimed practice.

On a very different note, I have a reminder about safety. Parents who pick up their children at 2:50 are reminded that there should be no automobile traffic in the bus loop while the buses are waiting to pick up students, from approximately 2:50 until 3:05. Also, I would ask parent to refrain from walking between buses parked in the loop – this is very dangerous. If you are a parent driver, it is best to park in the overflow lot nearest the soccer field at pick-up. That way, you will be able to walk back to your car on the sidewalk and get out of the lot before buses run. If you choose to use a spot near the school, we must ask you to wait for the buses to leave before moving your car. Thanks for your cooperation in this.

KINDERGARTEN TEAM

In math, we have been working on writing our numbers and counting to one hundred. We have been exploring different shapes. We are working on naming circles, triangles, rectangles, squares and hexagons. We will be starting to work on addition (Number +1, Number +10 and ways to make 10). We will be using our Cuisenaire Rods (colored rods that correspond to numbers 1-10) to help us learn our addition facts.



In language arts, the students have worked hard to associate each letter with their sounds. We use these sounds to make words. We are using popcorn words to write simple sentences. Please remember to read each night with your child!

Upcoming reading stories will focus on the theme of friendship. Students will observe people growing and changing through their relationships with others. By reading about ways in which friends and family influence real people and fictional characters, students will recognize how people influence each other. Lessons will focus on sequencing the story, narrative elements, and prefixes and suffixes. We will also look at how readers often must figure out parts of a story, because the author leaves out details or doesn't fully explain

certain events. In this case, the reader must look for clues in the story, plus what they know from real life, to reach a conclusion about what is happening.

The third graders enjoyed a wonderful field trip to the Concord Museum in Concord, MA right before Thanksgiving. They learned about the ways that the colonists and the Native Americans interacted with each other. The way of life of each group was effected by the presence of the other. We will be wrapping up our social studies unit on the foundations of government before

SECOND GRADE TEAM

The GMS second graders have been working hard and should be very proud of themselves! In math, we have been busy learning strategies for addition and subtraction of 2-digit numbers, using mental math as well as the more traditional regrouping method for finding sums and differences. Thank you, parents, for continuing to work on math fact memorization. You are helping us reach our goal of mastery of the addition and subtraction facts to 10 by 100% of our second graders!

In reading, we have been enjoying a variety of selections from our unit entitled "Our World". We've read plays, realistic fiction, and non-fiction, with plants and seeds as a common theme. We've integrated our new learning into writing, where we continued to write narratives and informational paragraphs. We also integrated this new learning into a science unit, learning about plants: their life cycles and the resources they provide for people.

In social studies, we wrapped-up our unit on Native Americans. We learned about five regions of our country (Northeast woodlands, the Southeast woodlands, plains, desert southwest, and Pacific Northwest), and how the land, weather, and resources affected the daily lives of Native Americans who lived there.

As a friendly reminder, please remember to send your child to school with appropriate outdoor gear for recess. This includes a hat, gloves or mittens, jacket, snowpants, and boots. Also, it would be helpful if these items were labeled with your child's name.


Lastly, we are always in need of tissues for the classroom. Any donations are greatly appreciated!

FOURTH GRADE TEAM

The fourth graders enjoyed their recent field trip to Concord. We visited the State House and the New Hampshire History Museum. At the State House we sat in the oldest legislative meeting hall in the USA. Here our representatives make important decisions about NH laws. While we were there we spoke with two representatives from Litchfield. We also met a singing senator! Senator Avarad played guitar and sang a song he created about government. Some students then briefly saw Governor Hassan as she was on her way to an important meeting.



The NH History Museum was also interesting. Here we saw the old, wooden, gold eagle that sat atop the State House from 1818-1952. Did you know that



if an eagle's head faces left in a statue, it means we are ready for war? If the eagle head is facing right, it is a peaceful time. We also compared old photos of New Hampshire with current ones of the same landscape. We learned so much and had lots of fun!

In math the fourth graders will soon begin learning long multiplication and division. Practicing their multiplication and division facts at home will make this process easier. Some students have been

using Xtra Math at school. This is a free, online program to practice math facts. Please encourage your child to use this program at home as well.

The Tournament of Readers Program is well underway. We are so proud of the Tournament of Readers participants for giving their time to read and compete in the program. Reading these books will also count for reading books toward the New Hampshire Fishercats Reading Challenge. If the students read five books, they can earn two free tickets to a Fishercats baseball game. They will get to go on the field and hang out with the mascot, Fungo!

LIBRARY NEWS,

The kindergarten classes have been listening to stories of how animals prepare for and survive the winter. These stories coincide with the themes that are being studied in the classroom.

The first grade classes have been working on alphabetical order as it pertains to finding books in the library. Our second grade classes have been also been focusing on alphabetical order so that they can become more independent with finding books in the Everyone and Fiction sections of the library. This skill will also help them with looking up words in a dictionary and will help them with our encyclopedia unit.

The third and fourth graders at GMS have been reviewing the fiction section. The third graders have also been working on a magazine assignment that includes how to use the Table of Contents. The fourth graders are going to be spending a great deal of time on the nonfiction section of the library including learning about the Dewey Decimal System of Classification.

Thank you to all of the people who volunteered to help out during the book fair. Some people worked more than one shift to make it happen! It is much appreciated! This fundraiser brought in slightly less than \$2,200 for the library to use to purchase materials and equipment for the students, parents and staff to use.

Please help your child to remember his or her library book by looking at the school calendar to see which days there are library specials. If the book is placed in the backpack the night before, then the book will be returned on time and he or she will be able to check out a new book. Thank you for your assistance!

Another way that you can assist your child is to make sure that he/she is using a plastic bag to place library books in, which can prevent spills that happen in backpacks. Plastic bags were provided at the beginning of the year, but they can develop holes so it is good to check them on occasion. Large sealable bags would be even better! Other common ways that books are damaged is by dogs and younger siblings. Please help your child find a safe and consistent place to store the library books, which can also prevent them from being lost.
